Feedback from Group Support

You will all have seen the Government's roadmap for ending restrictions on activities. By reference to that roadmap, Group Support has contacted group leaders to ascertain the group's preferred date for restarting. As one of the challenges we face is the timely booking of premises, the focus was on activities based in hired premises. The exercise proved to be a great catalyst to triggering the debate within each group as to what the consensus was on restart.

Nothing recorded in this exercise is binding. Groups will be contacted nearer the time, to verify the group's planned restart is unchanged. Similarly, our restart plan may have to be revised in line with any revisions to the Government roadmap and guidelines and advice from the Third Age Trust.

In outline, the feedback from premises-based activities can be summarized as:

10% of groups have opted for a Step 3 restart (no earlier than 17th May). It is important that these groups accept that social distancing applies and that for all groups other than exercise classes, the number of attendees at a session is limited to 6.

60% of groups have opted for a Step 4 restart (no earlier than 21st June). This marks the beginning of the 'new normal', where restrictions are removed. From this point onward, the onus is on individuals to undertake their own personal risk assessment and to decide whether they are comfortable that their wellbeing is not unduly threatened by participation in activities.

30% of groups have opted to defer restart until September.

The annual membership subscription remains at £15 and future membership years will run from 1st October to 30th September.

Treasurer's Report

The absence of premises-based activities in this 2020-2021 financial year means that comparison of our financial activity against that of the previous financial year is meaningless. Certain payments had to be made; most notably the payments to the Third Age Trust (£8,616) for membership and use of the Beacon system. The abandonment of courses and cancellation of planned courses and trips required that we repaid around £10,000 of members' contributions that had been paid in advance. Recognizing the special relationship which we have with the scouts and guides, we have been paying a monthly retainer that takes account of the use we make of the building for storing equipment and ensures the headquarters are there for us when we restart activities.

In summary, we started the 2020-2021 financial year with a bank balance of £60,413. Some 1,537 members renewed and their commitment to the u3a is greatly appreciated. £12,635 of the subscription money was received on or after 1st April 2020 and appears in the 2020-2021 accounts. Once the payments to the Third Age Trust, accountant's fees, refunds to members, premises retainer payments, website costs and the usual office expenses are factored in, we will end the 2020-2021 financial year on 31st March with a bank balance of around £54,000.

A fuller report will be provided alongside the accounts at our next AGM.

National Census Day 2021

The Census 2021 is going to be largely an on-line event. Everyone is required to complete a census form but arrangements have been made for (1) anyone not quite sure about what to do or (2) unable to complete it in this way.

If you have access to the internet but are unsure about what to do

Once you have received your Census letter you call the Support Service on 01772 595 463 for help to complete the details on-line. You will be given a date and time for an appointment, with a checked and trained adviser, who will talk you through the form.

If you have no internet access at all or you are unable to complete the on-line form because of a disability

You can request a paper copy from the Office for National Statistics Support Line 0800 141 2021. It will be sent to you by post and you can complete and return the form by post.

You have until 4 May to use these options.

Speaker Meetings go online

After a long break in 2020, we were able to arrange a series of Speaker Meetings via Zoom.

The first meeting took place on 4th February, when author and historian **Julia Clayton** transported us back 2500 years to Sparta, the largest of 2000 separate city states in the region now known as Greece. In an enthralling talk, we heard how Spartan ideas, attitudes and culture such as constitutional monarchy, token money, team sports and the welfare state, form the basis of our modern society. Julia commented that the Spartans would have approved of the u3a, conforming as it does to their philosophy of lifelong learning.

On Thursday 4th March over 50 members enjoyed a most entertaining and informative talk by professional entertainer **Stephen Wells**. The topic was 'The Curious Incident of Agatha Christie', and we heard how the famous author staged her own 'disappearance' in 1926, after receiving the devastating news that her husband had been having an affair. After a much publicised investigation involving Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Edgar Wallace and Dorothy L Sayers, she was finally found 10 days later, very much alive and well, at the Hydro Hotel in Harrogate (now the Old Swan), having caused huge embarrassment to her errant husband, whom she divorced shortly afterwards.

An excellent presentation, complete with archive photos, film clips and music, added to our enjoyment of this excellent talk, and you can now watch a recording of his talk here.
