On **9th June** David Hearne gave a detailed and fascinating account of the life and achievements of Sir William Brown. William was born in Liverpool but moved with his family to Baltimore,

then returned to Liverpool in 1810 and married his wife Sarah. They had 9 children, and William outlived all of them. William's interests covered shipping, banking and railways, and by 1836 he was turning over £10 million a year. \$1 in every \$6 of US overseas trade was handled by William Brown's companies.

On 1st September a large

audience gathered to hear Roger Blaxall speak about his interesting and exciting career as Public Relations Officer for Greater Manchester Police and also Lancashire Constabulary. In a very entertaining talk we heard about the Constable who stole cars to pay off his £58,000 gambling debt, the Sergeant who smuggled drugs to India whilst claiming to make monthly visits for specialist back treatment, and the Detective Sergeant whose strippergram party was covertly filmed and sent to the News of the World.

Church History group visits beautiful Beverley

ORGANISER Peter Gately writes: "Hurrah, at last! On August 16th, our coach left the Mission at Four Lane Ends bound for Beverley Minster, far to the East, almost on the Yorkshire coast.

Delayed from the original 2020 plan and then again from the rearranged **June** date of this year, our journey (at around 120 miles) was just about on the limit of what could be done for day-trip and slightly daunting for the organisers.

"We arrived in the pleasant town of Beverley just in time for lunch and we dispersed to find refreshments with some members also managing to fit in a quick visit to St

Mary's, the other marvellous medieval church in town,."

Lorna McDade takes up the story.

"St Mary's has an ornate chancel ceiling with depictions of (mostly) ancient kings of England.

In 2020 new figures, representing famous women and the chronicles of Narnia, replaced worn carvings on the nave walls on the exterior.

"We then assembled inside the Minster for a talk by **Brian Farrimond** on the history of this magnificent building. It was founded in the 8th century by St John of Beverley, who was later buried within its precincts, and it became a place of pilgrimage. This led to its wealth and

> prestige, enabling the canons to build this very large church, greater in length than eight of our cathedrals.

> "After this we split into two groups, one with Pete Gately, who explored the nave and toured the exterior features, the other with Peter Hatfield, looking at the chancel and the transepts.

"Despite the weather forecast which direly predicted rain and possible

thunderstorms, the only rain we encountered was on our return journey on the top of the Pennines.

"A fascinating and informative day out for which our thanks must go to the two Peters and Brian for their hard work in the organisation and the amount of time spent in preparing their knowledgeable talks."

Peter Gately concludes: "A long journey, but well worth it and we were back home in time for tea!"

IN THE beginning, there were three wise men. Alex McMinn, Ted Morrell and Jeff Roberts. All had come to the end of busy, professional lives and all were determined that retirement should offer more than shopping, the odd lunch out and pottering in the garden.

Alex McMinn, our President and founding Chairman, muses on the events that led him to establish our u3a.

Thirty years, after a career in international medicine followed by establishing a medical education company in the U.K. with his wife, herself an educationist, he contemplated retirement. He searched for a voluntary association of retired local people who would share with him their experiences. He would ask what they were doing to make their retirement meaningful. He found many were bored, lonely or

experienced declining self worth. Wherever he went the question was always the same. "What are you doing with yourself?"

He met a retired Haematologist from Norway, who had married an Ormskirk lady, bored with his experience; a retired Vice Chancellor bored with 'shopping'; a retired director of a clothing company. All felt their lives had become meaningless.

Out of all the encounters, he met a former colleague from Liverpool University

thday next year!

at the christening of his grandchild. Same old question: "What do you do with your time?" The reply, "I've found the U3A in Hull and it's really great."

Next day the news was shared with leff Roberts and Ted Morrell and in no time they found scores of people willing to share their life experiences.

Posterity will gain in the longer life from the initiative.

It so happened that an organisation called The University of the Third Age, founded in 1982 in the UK, was becoming more prominent as it developed nationwide. Together they found out all they could about the purpose and structure of u3a.

pages followed in 2006. There were usually four issues per year with a different colour cover for each one. Since 2021 we have been down to A5 size; but you never know, with a little luck, we may be up to A4 again one day! Bill Evans, Editor and Designer They found that retired people would benefit socially, mentally and physically by continuing to learn in an informal and pleasant way. That these local organisations could be run by their members and sustain themselves financially. u3as already existed in and around Sefton and Mersevside and were doing well. Self-help was the mantra and they determined to set up a u3a in Aughton and Ormskirk.

Ted Morrell writes: 'Alex, who lived and lives locally. concentrated upon drumming up local interest. I contacting u3a



nationally and locally to find out what needed to be done. Jeff was the Scout Leader with a 'new building to fill.' After some months of research and discussion, a decision to test the waters was made.

Jeff remembers: 'The S&G HQ was

booked for an open meeting in May 2003. Alex trudged the streets delivering numerous invitations and the meeting was well

attended with 40 plus people attending and signing up for a annual subscription of £5.00.

It was important to demonstrate that **u3a** was non-political and with no religious affiliations. Thus the first Working Party, then the first Committee, drew on men and women from all walks of life with experiences to match.

Ted explains who was involved. 'Alex was chair, me as secretary, Jeff as treasurer (he wanted to be paid rent!), Roy Baxendale as membership secretary, Dorothy Harrison, Joan Colquitt, Doreen McGiveron, Norman Platt and Alan Worthington. Each one agreed to set up at least one activity group.'

Sue Watkinson says: 'The early newsletter was a simple sheet of A4, filled both sides with forthcoming activities. As these became more numerous the type became smaller until four pages were needed. Membership grew, groups filled and new ones were developed.'

Regular coffee mornings, established on Thursdays, were titled 'Horizons' to illustrate the vision of the organisation.

As numbers grew, (80 plus by July 2003) it became apparent that this was an organisation that had a future, so a formal Launch Meeting was planned and held on 2nd October 2003 with a very special speaker ~ a clown by the name of Arthur Pedlar. He gave a memorable talk as he changed himself from a businessman to 'Vercoe' the world famous clown.

It will surprise today's members that Christ Church was filled with 250-300 members and friends on 'Speaker Meeting' day each month..

By the time of our first AGM in early March 2004, membership had grown to

370 with 20 active groups. The accounts showed an Income of £2,326 and Expenditure of £2,290, a surplus of £36.00, a far cry from current figures.

By May 2004 'Horizons' had became a weekly event. Membership continued to grow and was touching 500. Jeff remembers that some members thought we should close the books and put people on a waiting list!

Thus in one year a self-help Charity had been formed and registered with Third Age Trust (our parent body) and the Charity Commission. All this through the efforts of a Committee which had grown to 17 member and a band of some 40 plus group leaders/coordinators.

At five years (2008) our birthday was celebrated in fine style with a week long exhibition in the Scout HQ. The walls were lined with posters illustrating the huge variety of group activities and there was an activity each morning and afternoon to which all members and visitors were invited. The week ended with a show in Aughton Village Hall. At 10 years the celebrations went out into the community with a litter pick in Ormskirk, and a promotional event. And now we look forward to a 20th anniversary, surely a time for special celebrations. What shall we do? Ideas please.

Sue: "I'm member 417. I assembled the thoughts of the founders. (I didn't write it all myself.) Ted Morrell used to talk about 'Friends we have yet to meet' and that is what I most treasure about belonging to u3a. I have met and made so many good friends in the last 19 years. I've done things I thought were behind me or beyond me, enjoying holidays, doing something new, returning to old hobbies, helping with the magazine, becoming a trustee. Our u3a can be whatever its members want it to be, the future is as yet unwritten. Why not help to craft the next chapter?"

OUR 'Helping Each Other Group' went for a 'singalong' on a March afternoon at




