Election as Trustee to Third Age Trust

IT is pleasing to report that David Blanchflower, a trustee of the Aughton & Ormskirk u3a, has been elected by the u3a's located in the North West Region as a trustee of the u3a Third Age Trust.

The u3a Third Age Trust is the UK-wide body that represents all the 1,000 u3a's with around 400,000 members in the UK. The Trust works with local u3a's providing guidance, learning and administrative support.

The Trust is overseen by Trustees who are the Board of Directors and have legal responsibility for the decision-making processes that form and shape the future of the u3a movement.

The Third Age Trust provides practical central support to u3a's. This ranges from guidance and advice and model documents and policies such as constitutions, policies on areas relating to data protection, finance, insurance, legal risk assessments ~ to marketing materials and guidance on website, communications and branding.





Greek philosopher Plato's theory of


his philosophy'; 'The Philosophy of Mind'; and 'Some Problems of Know-ledge'.

This m o n t h the spotlight is on s o l i t a r y bees, and in particular Osmia Bicornis, or the Red Mason Bee. Solitary bees are very efficient pollinators, but in recent years their numbers have dropped due to loss of habitat and use of chemicals.

We can help by introducing the right plants, not using pest control products and just not being too fussy about tidiness in the garden. Be careful

too when purchasing 'bee hotels' ~ it's a good idea to do a bit of research before you buy.

The lifespan of a female Mason Bee is 4-6 weeks, the male even less.



The minute they emerge from the cocoon they know exactly what they have to do: reproduce themselves.

As long as the weather permits and there is a plentiful supply of pollen, the female will choose a nesting site and lay one or two eggs a day, carefully providing a supply of pollen for the grub to eat when it hatches, and sealing each tiny chamber with mud before moving on to the next one.

> In my garden I provide cardboard tubes for the bees to use as nesting sites, which are then stored over winter and opened up in the spring, hopefully reveal a to number of cocoons, ready to start the process all over again.

We need to look after our bees. Without pollination, not much happens. If you're introducing new plants into your garden, go for the ones the bees love: Lavender, Salvia, Foxgloves, Verbena

> Bonariensis, Echinacea~ there are lots more. Love your bees! PAM BALL

In this edition we're going to shine the spotlight on **REPAIRING** items instead of throwing them away.


Repairing

Learning with the National u3a

IN the last **u3a** Magazine, I wrote a short article which included a list of opportunities offered free to **u3a** members by the National Office and publicised via their website (*www.u3a.org.uk*).

These cover an eclectic range of topics via online talks, workshops and courses (www.u3a.org.uk/events).

The events are mostly now bookable via Eventbrite ~ a well-known, reliable

and easy-to-use booking app. They are hosted on Zoom - a video-conferencing system that many of us became familiar with during Covid lockdown.


The National Website provides 'How to Guides' for using Zoom ... or you could consult our local Aughton & Ormskirk u3a Computer Helpers at Horizons.

Over the years, I have taken advantage of some of the National **u3a** learning programmes. But my most recent one

was a 6-session Zoom Course on Cryptic Crosswords held over December and January.

This excellent course was run by Henry Howarth who has taught over one thousand adults on the topic. He is the author of the book 'Learn How to Solve Cryptic Crosswords', on which the course is based, and an app called 'Learn Cryptic Crosswords'.

You needed Henry's book for reference and exercises, in addition to access to a laptop, desktop or tablet computer and a broadband connection. Having signed up using Eventbrite,



participants were emailed the Zoom login details and further information prior to start of course sessions.

It all ran very smoothly indeed and Henry proved to be a really excellent teacher. He used a combination of minilectures, practical exercises and homework. There were around 60 attendees at each session which lasted 90 minutes with a short comfort break in the

middle.

This proved to be a very professional course! Henry's verbal explanations were excellent, well complemented by his slideshow and other screen-shared information, summaries, demos and practical exercises. The level and breadth of the course content was ideal ~ certainly for me Ι suspect, the and, majority of **u3**a attendees.

The book was a perfect accompaniment to this course, providing follow-

up study and exercises for each class plus reference materials for later use and revision.

Its price was very reasonable indeed, especially as the course itself is free to **u3a** members.

The other free Zoom sessions I've been joining recently in my capacity as Web Manager, are about **u3a** SiteWorks.

Alan Nolan, another member of the core Web Team, has also been attending these SiteWorks information meetings and in the article opposite, explains more about this interesting development.

u3a SiteWorks

FOR the past 18 months or so, the National u3a has been developing a replacement for the u3a SiteBuilder website system used by nearly 700 u3a's. The new system is called u3a

SiteWorks and is being rolled out to existing SiteBuilder u3a's.

SiteWorks uses

the popular WordPress core software that powers about 40% of the world's websites. The u3a SiteWorks project team has customised it specifically for u3a's.

For example, the SiteWorks version recognises Activity Groups, Group Categories, Venues, Events, Leaders and many more entities and attributes. (Ours is not a SiteBuilder website but does use WordPress software.)

The SiteWorks project team created a roll-out queue for existing SiteBuilder u3a's and is steadily working through the list.



Other u3a's are allowed to register their potential interest in moving to the SiteWorks system and

I registered our u3a with the SiteWorks project in December so we are kept in touch.

The project to migrate u3a's from SiteBuilder to SiteWorks is moving ahead quite quickly and may soon reach u3a's such as ours that have not used SiteBuilder. Could this be a possibility for the next generation of our website? ALAN NOLAN

On **8th February** journalist Angela Danby returned with more interesting tales from her time working for the Southport Visiter, and on **14th March** magician Pete Turner amazed us all with his talk 'Through the Eyes of a Magician' (*we still don't know how he did what he did!*).

On **9th May** our speaker will be Dr John Patterson, Principal of St Vincent's School for visually impaired children, in

the Archdiocese of Liverpool. After taking over as Principal in 2012, John set about encouraging students' entrepreneurialism, employment skills, creativity, and solidarity with those less fortunate. On Wednesdays pupils choose lessons they feel play to their strengths, including in music, drama, sports, ICT, environmental work, and growing food on the school grounds to use in a student-run café.

One of his many achievements has been to oversee pupils developing a disability sports toolbox that now helps children in 20 countries across four continents. John's talk will focus on the ethos and aims of the school, and on what has been achieved during his time as Principal.

There will be no meeting in June, then our speaker on **11th July** will be u3a member and retired solicitor Jeff

Vernon. *Jeff writes:* We are all consumers; we all buy goods and services both in shops and on-

line. Normally all goes well and we are happy with what we have bought but, occasionally,

NW Region of u3a's

WHEN the u3a movement began in the UK in 1982, every new local group was simply part of the national organisation. The Third Age Trust was formed as their parent body and

remains as such, now with an additional level of support.

About 2008, Regions were established corresponding to national administrative boundaries.

The North West covered Cumbria, Cheshire, Lancashire, Merseyside and Greater Manchester. This laver wasn't an administrative function, it was intended to offer extra support for the growing numbers of u3a's, which needed help in establishing their organisations.

Each Region elects a Trustee to represent the members. Regions are encouraged to put on events, some for their officers and committees and others for the members, to inspire, inform, educate or entertain.

Over the twenty years the North West Region has run many training days, fun events for members' participation, a regular summer school, exciting Annual General Meetings with guest speakers and lots of the essential local support in establishing and nurturing our 100 plus u3a network.


